First, the wonderful, longer daylight hours remind of us of the promise of warmer weather, of blooming flowers, bushes, and trees, and of visiting our neighbors outdoors is to soon come.

Second, as the temperatures warm, the Village of Broadview will begin our annual repairing of streets, removing of dead trees or replacing water mains throughout the village. In a town as old as Broadview, I believe it is critical that we constantly maintain and improve our infrastructure. As mayor, preserving and enhancing Broadview's infrastructure will always remain a top priority.

Third, I will be working collaboratively and transparently with the Board of Trustees to craft a responsible budget for the new fiscal year. Although there are fiscal uncertainties due to COVID-19, the Village of Broadview has a strong financial positon to weather the ongoing storm in the near term.

In the long-term, the Village of Broadview must address multiple budget issues, including the stability of the sales tax base, increasing pension obligations, rising healthcare costs, funding for vehicles, equipment, building capital repairs, and investing in street and alley improvements.

In the meantime, the Village Board of Trustees and I remain committed to a conservative spending plan this year to protect taxpayers' wallets while continuing to invest in our community and to provide superior services that you, our residents, expect. We will continue to evaluate village operations to assure residents and our business stakeholders alike that we are managing the village budget as efficiently and economically as possible.

In addition to spring construction and the annual budget, I want to note other important, on-going issues on my agenda:

- · A community conversation has begun on the senior housing project and the Amazon warehouse
- Broadview has partnered with StarLab to provide free COVID testing for more than 200 residents
- More than 100 Broadview residents have so far received a COVID vaccination
- More than 3,500 Broadview residents have received free groceries and basic nutrition items throughout Proviso Township
- A dialogue of racial healing has begun between Broadview residents and the Village of Broadview Police Department

From the Desk of

Finance Director Timothy Hicks, CPA

The Village has done a tremendous job in responding to the COVID-19 Pandemic. The Mayor instructed the finance team to evaluate the Village's Budget every 90 days to ensure that we could appropriately and timely limit expenditures to the estimated revenues to ensure that the Village continues to be fiscally responsible in these trying times. During the Pandemic sales tax revenue has remained on pace to meet or exceed the FY21 Budget due to having several big box retailers in the Village. These big box retailers have benefited from increased sales and thus the Village has seen sales taxes remain consistent throughout this fiscal year which has off-set the decrease experienced by other smaller businesses in the Village. The Village's largest source of revenue comes from property taxes and year to date property tax revenues is down 10% vs budget but we expect that revenue will end the year flat to budget as we anticipate collections and disbursements from Cook County to increase in the last quarter of the fiscal year.

Lastly, the Village was able to secure several state and federal grants related to COVID-19 that have helped to offset the additional expenditures purchased by the Village to ensure that the Village remains safe and the additional personnel costs.

Garage & Storage Spring Cleanup Tips

Happy Spring from the Broadview Fire Department. Here some safety tips for garage and storage spring cleanup from the National Fire Protection Association. For more safety tips go to nfpa.org/education

RAGS WET WITH PAINT AND STAIN

- Never leave cleaning rags in a pile. At the end of the day, take the rags outside to dry.
- Hang the rags outside or spread them on the ground. Weigh them down. Do this so they do not blow away. Make sure they are not in a pile. Keep them away from buildings.
- Put dried rags in a metal container. Make sure the cover is tight. Fill the container with a water and detergent solution. This will break down the oils.
- Keep containers of oily rags in a cool place. Keep them out of direct sunlight. Keep them away from other heat sources. Check with your town for information on disposing of them.

LIQUIDS THAT CAN CATCH FIRE

- Flammable and combustible liquids should not be used near an open flame. Do not smoke when working with these liquids.
- If you spill liquids on your clothing, remove your clothing and place them outside to dry. Once dry, clothing can be laundered.
- Keep liquids in their original containers. Keep them tightly capped or sealed. Never store the liquids in glass containers.

GASOLINE

- Use gasoline only for motor fuel. Never use it as a cleaner. Never use it to break down grease. Never bring gasoline indoors, even in small amounts.
- Store gasoline ONLY in a container that is sold for that purpose. Make sure the container is tightly capped when not in use. NEVER store gasoline containers in a basement or in the occupied space of a building. Keep them in an outside building, a detached garage, or a shed outdoors.

Don't forget to "Spring Forward" Change your clocks and check your smoke detector batteries!

Unemployment Insurance Identity Theft Fraud

Identity thieves and hackers have long known how to use stolen identities to commit fraud – for example, to open a new credit card or file a false tax return – and criminals using stolen identities to defraud public assistance programs is not new. In fact, such schemes are so pervasive that federal rules require Illinois to have staff dedicated to preventing and stopping fraudulent activity in the Unemployment Insurance (UI) system.

IDES partners with local and federal law enforcement agents, the Department of Labor's Office of Inspector General, Attorney General, State's Attorney and US Attorney's Offices to help us in our fight against fraud.

Below, we answer the most common questions we hear from residents regarding this crime:

I am a victim of the Illinois Department of Employment Security scam/fraud, do I need to report it to IDES? Yes, you should report the Identity Theft to IDES

Will the Broadview Police Department make a report?
Yes. We will document the crime, but the IDES will handle the investigation.

How can I spot unemployment insurance identity theft?

- You receive a debit card or an unemployment insurance letter (UI Finding) and have not filed a claim for benefits.
- You are notified by your employer that a claim for benefits has been filed when you have not been separated from employment.

- You attempt to file a claim online and one already exists.
- You receive IRS correspondence regarding unreported UI benefits.
- You receive notice of a state or federal tax offset.

What steps should I take if I receive a debit card or a UI Finding letter, and did not file for unemployment benefits?

If you suspect a claim has been submitted using your information, and you have not applied for unemployment insurance benefits in Illinois, take steps as follows:

- Report the fraudulent claim at the IDES website
- DO NOT activate the debit card that was mailed to you.
- DO NOT contact KeyBank.
- Request your free credit reports via www. annualcreditreport.com and review them for other fraudulent activities.

Car Jackings

In 2020 and early 2021, the City of Chicago and several suburbs have seen a troubling increase in Vehicular Hijackings (also known as Car Jackings). While many have speculated about the reasons for this dramatic surge, it is safe to say that there are a few things you can do to help keep you from becoming a victim:

- Be aware of your surroundings and who is around you.
- Stay alert and trust your instincts.
- Don't leave you car running at the gas pumps.
- If you have small children, consider filling up your tank when they're not with you.
- Don't sit in your car with the doors unlocked.
- If you must stop for any reason, stick to well-lit
- Always have your cell phone close by, in case you need to call 911.



The Chicagoland area has seen a dramatic increase in carjackings this year. In light of the recent killing of Retired Chicago Fire Department Lieutenant Dwain Williams, we'd like to offer you some tips to help avoid becoming a victim.

- No vehicle is worth your life. If someone threatens you and tries to take your car, let them have it.
- Always be aware of your surroundings.
- Never leave your car running and unattended. Criminals are looking for cars with the keys in the ignition. Gas stations are a prime location for carjackings.
- As you approach your vehicle, have your keys in your hand.
- Always park in well lighted areas
- Check your backseat before you get into the car.
- If a suspicious person approaches your car, drive away carefully.
- Avoid using drive-up ATM machines
- When stopped in traffic, make sure to leave room to escape, if necessary. If you suspect someone is following you, don't go home. Drive to the nearest
- olice of fire station or a well-lighted, populated area for help. If you are targeted, don't resist, especially if the thief has a weapon.


Alley Enforcement

Many Broadview residents who live north of Roosevelt Road would agree that there is too much non-resident traffic in the alleys, and that some of these drivers are not driving safely. We want you to know that we have heard your complaints and are stepping up enforcement in the alleys around Broadview, assuring that people are paying attention to posted signs and watching their speed. By ordinance, alley parking is prohibited in Broadview. This is to assure that residents can easily and safely travel through the alley and exit their garages without worrying that they will strike a parked vehicle. It also provides safe access for Police and Fire vehicles.

Bicycle Registration Day

Every year, stolen bicycles are recovered by the Police Department, and officers often have no way of determining the owner. This Spring (date TBD), the Police Department will be hosting bicycle registration day. Broadview Residents can bring their bicycle to have a unique number assigned. This number will be kept on file at the police department, so that when a bicycle is recovered, we can quickly and easily find the owner. This new number serves as an additional identifier for other police agencies and can be entered into a statewide system.

In the spring of 2019 the Illinois Housing Development Authority(IHDA) Board passed Resolution 2019-IHDA-09H which authorized the 1,500,000 tax credits for the Village of Broadview Senior Housing Project. Spring Cleaning...





With Spring on its way, here are seven tips for giving the season the welcome it deserves:

- The best refrigerator cleaner is a combination of salt and soda water. The bubbling action of the soda water combines with the abrasive texture of the salt to make a great cleaner.
- The best way to get rid of lime buildup around the faucet it is to lay paper towels over the fixture, soak it with vinegar and let it set for an hour. The deposits will soften and become easier to remove.
- Clean screens with a scrap of carpeting. It makes a powerful brush that removes all the dirt.
- 4. Clean windows with a rag and soapy water, and then dry them with another rag. You can also go to an auto-parts store and buy a windshield squeegee, which cleans very well.
- 5. If drapes are looking drab, take them out of the window, remove the hooks and run them through the air-fluff cycle in the dryer along with a wet towel (to draw off the dust) for 15 minutes. Hang them back in the windows immediately.
- 6. Clean the blades of a ceiling fan by covering them with a coat of furniture polish. Wipe off the excess and lightly buff.
- Sometimes comforters, blankets and pillows don't need to be cleaned, but they do need to be aired out after a long winter in your closed-up home.

Ordinances:

Over the past year, we have received several questions regarding permits, contractor registrations and the garbage ordinance. Please refer to the Village of Broadview Building Code (www.broadview-il.gov) for information regarding:

PERMITS:

R105.1: Permits Required

Any owner or authorized agent who intends to construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, demolish, or change the occupancy of a building or structure, or to erect, install, enlarge, alter, repair, remove, convert or replace any electrical, gas, mechanical or plumbing system, the installation of which is regulated by this code, or to cause any such work to be done, shall first make application to the building official and obtain the required permit.

CONTRACTOR REGISTRATION:

9-2-8.

Any contractor or subcontractor, whether an individual, sole proprietor, partnership or corporation, performing work in the village shall not commence work until the contractor or subcontractor has first applied for and received an annual certificate of registration.

Applications for the certificate of registration shall be submitted on forms supplied by the Building department.

All applications shall be accompanied by a registration fee in the amount of fifty dollars (\$50.00), and by proof of a bond in the minimum sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00); provided however that the following contractors shall submit proof of a bond in the sums stated in section 3-1-6 of this code: house movers; sign erectors; building wreckers.

Upon receipt of the completed application, required fee and proof of bond, the building commissioner shall issue the certificate.

The annual certificate shall be valid for the current calendar year of January 1 to December 31. (Ord. 09-34, 8-3-2009)

GARBAGE COLLECTION

4-5-3: COLLECTION BY VILLAGE; RESIDENTIAL UNITS:

A. Residential Units:

- 1. Solid Waste Containers: Residential units shall be responsible to utilize village approved sixty-five (65) gallon solid waste containers for the disposal of municipal waste within the village.
- 2. Additional Waste: If the residential unit has additional waste, which exceeds the maximum capacity of the sixty-five (65) gallon solid waste container, they may place their own thirty-five (35) gallon containers out for collection provided that the residential unit attaches an additional solid waste sticker to said garbage receptacle.
- 7. Placement of Containers: Residential unit garbage and trash containers shall be placed at the edge of the alley or on the parkway between the hours of six o'clock (6:00) P.M. of the day preceding collection until seven o'clock (7:00) P.M. of the day of collection.
- 10. Location of Containers: All containers for garbage, ashes and household rubbish shall be stored outside the residence or other building in an accessible place and at ground level on the owner's private property. No container used for the storage, collection and removal of garbage or other refuse shall be placed in a thoroughfare or in a manner which constitutes a nuisance to adjacent property or the occupants thereof or to the public in general. (Ord. 11-13, 5-16-2011)



Lead Hazard Reduction Grant Program - Common Questions

- What is this program? The Lead Hazard Reduction Grant Program provides free lead paint inspections; and no cost repairs for any lead paint hazards found during the inspection.
- Why is this program important? We offer this program to fix lead paint hazards because we know that lead exposure can make it hard for children to learn, pay attention, and succeed in school.
- 3. Who can apply? An adult living in a grant priority community, who has a child under 6 years old living with them or visiting them regularly OR a pregnant woman in the household can apply.
- **4.** Who qualifies for the program? Applicants will qualify if they:
 - a. Live in a grant community
 - b. Live in a house built before 1978
 - c. Live with children under 6 years old
 - d. Babysit or have children under 6 years old who visit them often
 - e. Have income below the grant program limit
- Can renters apply? Yes. We will need to get approval from landlord during the application process to make sure that they want their building inspected and fixed.
- 6. My grandkids (or cousins, or the kids I babysit, etc.) don't live with me, but they visit me a lot. Can I apply for the grant program? An applicant may qualify if they meet the other criteria (income, location and age of home) even if young children don't live with them. If a child spends a few hours at your house at least twice a week for a minimum of 10 weeks during the year, you could qualify. That means that many babysitters, grandparents, aunts, and neighbors who watch children younger than 6 years old can qualify for this program.
- How do I complete an application? The easiest way is to call the staff who help people fill out these applications.
 - a. If you live in a WESTERN suburb, call: Northwest Housing Partnership at 847-969-0561
- 8. Can we fill the application out now? Yes go right ahead. You have to fill in some information- mostly your name, the names of members of your family, and your contact information. Then you will have to gather some documents to copy to submit with your application.
- 9. What documents do I need?
 - a. RENTERS AND HOMEOWNERS need to provide income information. We need income information for anyone who is 18 years or older. Our preference is for you to submit a copy of your income tax forms. We can also accept check stubs or a letter from an employer. If you submit check stubs, we need stubs from at least two months.
 - i. If someone is 18 years old or older and does not have income,

- that is ok. They need to fill out a "no income" form. It has to be notarized. Most libraries have a notary public that will stamp the form for free.
- b. RENTERS AND HOMEOWNERS need to provide a copy of their IDs. Please submit a copy of ID for every person 18 or older.
- c. LANDLORDS and HOMEOWNERS need to provide a copy of the deed to the house.
- d. LANDLORDS and HOMEOWNERS need to provide a copy of their last mortgage statement (bill).
- e. LANDLORDS and HOMEOWNERS need to provide a copy of their last tax bill.
- 10. What happens after I apply? Staff at the application agency will review all the information. They might call you with questions or ask for other/additional documents. Usually, if all the copies above are provided, the staff can look it over and let you know in a few days if you qualify.
- 11. What happens if I qualify? The person you've been working with will let you know usually by phone and definitely by letter that you qualify for the program. Then, CCDPH program staff will contact you to schedule the lead inspection of your home. We try to have the inspection happen within a week or two.
- 12. Who does the lead inspection? What happens during the inspection? We work with a lead inspector named Ed Topp, from a company called Lead Inspector USA. Ed will come out to your home and conduct an inspection of the inside and outside of your home. He uses an XRF machine. a hand-held machine that can detect the presence of lead paint on walls, windowsills, etc. He will also take some photographs and make some notes. He may take a small sample of soil from outside the home for a lab to analyze for the presence of lead. It takes 1-2 hours for him to complete the inspection. You will receive a copy of his full report after it is complete and the lab results are received.
- 13. What happens after the lead inspection?
 It takes about two weeks, and then we will share the copy of the report with you. There are a few possible outcomes:
 - a. NO lead hazards are found. This could mean that there was no lead paint at all found in or around your home, or it could mean that while there is some lead paint, it is in good condition and is not a hazard. If there IS lead paint but it is not a hazard, the report will tell you where it is and suggest what you can do to keep it safe.
 - b. <u>Lead hazards are found.</u> If we find lead hazards, that means that there is lead paint in your home that is not intact and presents a safety hazard. The report will tell you where the hazards are. You

- may have some areas of your home where there are hazards and areas where there is lead that is NOT a hazard because it does not need repair. Our program will fix any lead hazards that we find.
- c. If there are hazards, the CCDPH Lead Grant Program Manager, Jason Applegate, will call you to set up the next appointments to get your hazards fixed.
- 14. How are the hazards fixed? The CCDPH lead grant program manager, Jason Applegate, will schedule a visit to complete "work specifications." At that visit, he will look at all the hazards, write down details of the work to be completed, and take measurements for the work to be completed. He will review that information with you. Then, he will complete the paperwork the grant requires before work can begin. A licensed lead abatement contractor will be assigned to complete the "work specifications" and will work with you to schedule when the work will take place. The abatement contractor will complete all the work in the specifications.
- 15. What kind of work does the contractor do to make the lead hazards safe? That varies depending on the home, but often things like replacing windows and repainting surfaces (walls, ceilings, etc.) is completed by the contractors.
- 16. Can I be home when the work is done? At the very least, families will need to stay out of certain areas of the home during the work. In many cases, families need to leave the home for the duration of the project in order for them not to be exposed to hazardous lead paint dust during remediation. Families need to agree to stay out of the areas that the contractors specify during the work.
- 17. I don't have anywhere to go during the work what can I do? Many families in the grant program who need to relocate during the lead hazard remediation have friends or family they can stay with during the work. If a family doesn't have that option, CCDPH may be able to pay for a hotel stay during the hazard remediation work. During the time when the Project Manager is scheduling the work, he will discuss your options with you.
- 18. There has to be a catch is this really free? There is no catch. This program will fix lead-based paint hazards at no cost to you. The money that allows us to do this is from a grant program dedicated to protecting kids from lead poisoning. Doctors know that lead hazards can hurt young kids their brains are developing quickly, and lead can get in the way of proper development, making it harder for kids to learn, follow directions, and behave well. The grant money corrects lead hazards because it is better to protect kids and prevent lead poisoning from occurring.




